True Authority

Gen 1:26 God said, Let Us [Father, Son, and Holy Spirit] make mankind in Our image, after Our likeness, and let them have complete authority over the fish of the sea, the birds of the air, the [tame] beasts, and over all of the earth, and over everything that creeps upon the earth. [AMP]

It was God's intention for man to have this authority over the earth and all the creatures upon it. Man's authority was lost in Eden at the time of the fall because Adam submitted to the serpent, Satan, in the garden, thereby relinquishing his authority to the enemy. We have supposedly regained authority, through Christ, when we are submitted to Him and use the authority of his name. Nevertheless, the literal authority over animals, whether tame or domesticated, mentioned in the above verse in Genesis, seems to no longer exist. Despite our status as the most intelligent "rulers" of the world, we cannot have complete authority over God's other creations. How then, could the above verse be applied to the Christian life?

I had a dream once in which I was being chased by wild dogs. I was looking for a hiding place when suddenly I looked up and there, in the sky, was a flock a birds flying in the most beautiful pattern I'd ever seen. I seemed to relax, as I watched them fly. I did not worry about the dogs anymore.

For many weeks, previous to the dream, I had been dealing with an illness in my physical body that had quite preoccupied my mind. I was terribly worried about it. Then I was inspired to begin pouring over the truth about my relationship with God and finding some solace in that. In fact, I began to not worry about my health but, instead, began to put my full attention on the truth that God was showing me, in the inspiring books I was reading. I began to underline certain powerful phrases, which, later, I copied onto index cards and carried with me in my shirt pocket. Whenever I felt oppressed by either circumstances or my health, I pulled a card out of my pocket and began to read it, intensely.

We easily become a ship without a rudder, shredded sails flailing in the winds, as we are tossed about in the wild sea of carnality in which we now reside. After doing that for a while and receiving much peace about my circumstances and a stronger faith in God, I had that dream which I related above. God used animals to let me know how I was doing with my work to obtain God's peace of mind. I was trying to hide from the wild dogs that wanted to tear me up, but my gaze was elevated to the skies, where, to my amazement and delight, birds were flying in wonderful patterns.

The dogs were the worries I was having about my physical condition. The birds were the thoughts of God, which I was willing to have, as my gaze was shifted upward by God. These are the animals we are to have complete authority over. They are our thoughts. We are not victims of our thoughts, but we create them as we reside in our free will. We are supposed to have complete authority over them, but often we don't.

This is exercising authority at its best!

Much, too willingly, we allow our thoughts to be controlled by other people's perception of what they believe is important "news." Or we are only too willing to sit down and be bombarded with inane and pointless thoughts of actors who have memorized a script written by someone, who may be out of God's loop.

We easily become a ship without a rudder, shredded sails flailing in the winds as we are tossed about in the wild sea of carnality in which we now reside. Is there no purpose? we cry. Is everything as it seems? Are we immobilized? Are we truly stuck in the muck and mire of this world?

In 2_{nd} Corinthians 10:5, the apostle Paul admonishes us to "take captive (have dominion over) every thought and make it obedient to Christ." This is exercising authority at its best.

In the above Genesis verse, God said we are to have complete authority over all the birds and animals of this world. I believeGod would like to see us use our free will to



take complete authority over our thoughts and allow them only to dwell on the truth as found in the Bible. We must dwell on the Good News (the Gospel), and let the world and the thoughts it would like us to focus on, go. We are no longer subject to its limitations and its
